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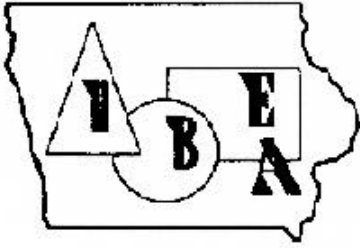
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The theme of our recent fall convention focused on change—this is one of those changes arising out of necessity. Although the Executive Board had in the past discussed making the *News & Views* available only on the web, budget cuts at the Department of Education have forced the issue. Having our newsletter now available online will save us postage dollars and get you each issue in a more timely manner.

2001 Convention. The 2001 Convention once again provided a terrific opportunity for you to meet in Des Moines to find new information, tips, and tools that will help you as you work with your students and coworkers. Keynote speaker Steve Siemens jump-started our convention with his entertaining and motivating words. His presentation, *If It Isn't Broken, Break It*, challenged us to change our attitudes, our beliefs, and our habits to be more self-confident and effective in our daily lives.

Personal Notes. Mr. Siemens' message hit home particularly for me as I have undergone drastic changes in my life this past year. At the end of the 2000-2001 school year, my husband and I unexpectedly moved to Fort Mill, South Carolina, to take advantage of a transfer opportunity for him in Charlotte, North Carolina (just across the border). The timing couldn't have been worse for me as the president-elect of IBEA! However, most of the convention groundwork had already been laid; and the planning committee work moved forward just as always via e-mail.

The biggest struggle for me was what to do next—continue with the new responsibilities as president or appoint another member to fulfill the duties? After checking the Constitution and discussing the issue with the Executive Board and several former Board members, we determined that an out-of-state president could work. Presidents-elect are actually approached by nominating committees several years in advance so that they can be more involved with the Board and gain experience with IBEA leadership. Although we do have a Board member willing to be appointed to complete the term if distance becomes an issue, we anticipate fewer problems with the status quo.

After having lived and taught in Cedar Falls/Waterloo for 22 years, my commitment to Iowa teachers and business education is not diminished by a mere move to the South! As 90 percent of our work is done electronically, I look forward to being an advocate for you and to facing the challenges of the coming year together with you without skipping a beat!

Convention Evaluations. Thanks to so many of you who took the time to complete your evaluations after the convention this year. Have you ever wondered if your comments really have an impact on future conventions? Yes, they certainly do! Next year's planning committee will spend a great deal of time discussing your comments at their first meeting to make the next convention best fit your needs.

I wish that we could take action on all of your suggestions and comments and rectify each and every problem. Unfortunately, when a presenter cancels a session that you couldn't wait to go to at the last minute, we are often unable to find a similar backup. We don't know that the two sessions you wanted to attend were scheduled at the same time. And *your* favorite session just might have been the *worst* session attended by one of your colleagues! At the same time, we make the changes that we can according to your constructive criticism.

Your suggestions for breakout session topics are always appreciated. The planning committee always tries to present a variety of topics that appeal to members. If you also know of potential presenters, please make sure to e-mail or call a planning committee member to assist them in finding the most appropriate speakers.

For those of you who filled out the section on volunteering in some capacity, thank you for your dedication to IBEA. If you don't hear from the planning committee chair or a Board member right away, please don't think that you are not needed! Many of the leadership positions are filled on a rotating basis, and may not be available the year you volunteer. Keep volunteering!

Some of you don't like having to schedule our future conventions so far in advance. Our bylaws require us to schedule at least two years out. However, the reality is that if we don't schedule *at least* that far in advance, the hotels will already be booked. In fact, this year's convention was a week later than normal because of scheduling conflicts with the hotel. Since we need a hotel's entire convention facility, we lose some flexibility in making last-minute plans.

Summer Convention. Several members of IBEA have suggested that we move our convention to the summer to avoid conflicts with football, conferences, etc.; to eliminate the need for hard-to-find substitutes; and to perhaps encourage greater attendance just because your school commitments are fewer. At its last meeting, the Board appointed a committee to study such a move. I may not consciously think about this on a daily basis, but I am thankful that I am able to go to work each day and perhaps make a small difference in someone's life. The challenges we face each day seem small compared to the sacrifices made by Americans in New York, Washington, and Pennsylvania. I hope as you go about your daily routines this winter and spring that you also will dwell less on the challenges and difficulties and more on the blessings and opportunities available to you.

The second phase was an employer/student symposium with Des Moines businesspeople over the ICN. This symposium exposed both NK and West Bend/Mallard business students to a broader scope of available employment opportunities and supplied information on skills desired in future employees. Information gleaned from the symposium helped the students know what skills they should incorporate and highlight in their e-portfolios.

During the third phase, students were given the freedom to design their portfolios with requirements including at least three hyperlinks and linkages to a resume and one scanned recommendation letter. Students included term papers, scanned desktop publishing projects, academic and sports awards, art projects, PowerPoint presentations created for history and science classes, etc. Peer-review sessions throughout the design process took place. There were great discussions and sharing of portfolio content and concerns.

Upon completion of their electronic portfolios, the NK Vocational Advisory Committee viewed the projects and critiqued them. A showcase evening was held and students had the opportunity to show their portfolios to the public. This was a wonderful opportunity because several local businesspeople attended and previewed, discussed, and evaluated the student's projects.

Because NK won an Iowa Showcase Technology Award for this project, the students have had wonderful opportunities to present across the state. Mary Jo's students have conducted workshops to teachers from AEA 3. They have shared their e-portfolios with college students and instructors. They were invited to the ITEC Convention and St. Paul, Minnesota to present their e-portfolios.

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2001 Outstanding Service to Business Education Awards Recipients

AREA 3: Tom Magee of Tom Magee Law Office in Emmetsburg

Tom Magee of Tom Magee Law Office in Emmetsburg was nominated for the Service to Business Award by Kathy Morkin of Armstrong-Ringsted School. Mr. Magee has volunteered for the past 6 years to help Armstrong-Ringsted students as their Mock Trial Legal Counsel and has served as a judge at the Iowa Lake Community College's Business Competition Day. He has also set up visits to courthouses and jails for business students at Armstrong-Ringsted. He is a friend of Business Education in Area 3.

AREA 6: Terry Buzbee of Fisher Controls in Marshalltown

Terry Buzbee of Fisher Controls in Marshalltown was nominated by Donna Packer and Jean Stonewall of Marshalltown High School, Area 6, for his efforts in expanding the coop work/internship program for students at Marshalltown High School. Marshalltown freshmen receive a folder from Fisher controls and participate in a career fair; sophomore students have a field trip through Fisher Controls, getting to see business at all levels; as juniors, students can set up job shadowing experiences; and finally, as seniors, students can become interns working anywhere from 12.5 to 20 hours per week in positions such as computer techs, data entry, accounting clerks, administrative assistants, computer and software installers, and human resources clerks. Every year Fisher expands the availability of positions for students. Student who have participated in the program say that this experience was instrumental in helping them make their college and career choices. Congratulations to Terry Buzbee.

AREA 9: Doug Rempfer of Iowa Workforce Development Center in Clinton

Doug Rempfer, Iowa Workforce Development Center in Clinton was nominated by LuAnn Farrell of Clinton Community College for Area 9. 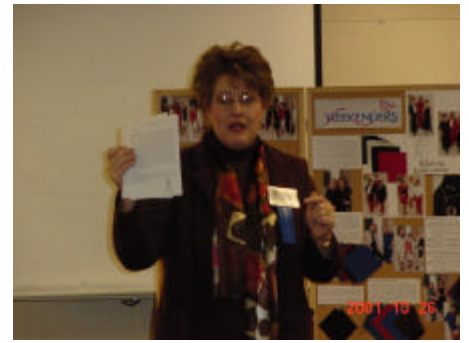

Arranging Tours of the Fed for Your Classroom

The Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago has long been a favorite destination of school groups. In 2000, 37% of the groups touring the Chicago Fed were high school groups. Colleges and select junior high groups also are frequent visitors. With the new Visitors Center now in operation, demand is expected to stay high.

Educators who are interested in bringing classes to tour the Chicago Fed can arrange for tours if they meet some specific criteria:

- Students must be in either high school or college and taking an economics, personal finance, business or related course.
- Teachers of students under high school age can arrange a tour if their class is part of the State of Illinois “Bank in School” program.
- There must be a minimum of two adults for every 30 students in the group.

Student groups that do not qualify for a tour are invited to stop and enjoy the Visitors Center any time they are in the area.

On the tour, students see a presentation on the role of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago and the Federal Reserve System in the economy. They will get to see and enjoy the Visitors Center. They will also see the cash operations area from our cash viewing room.

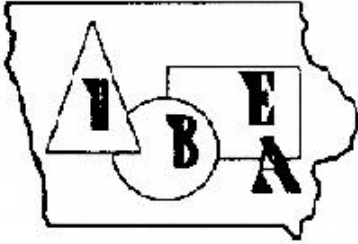
